Feb. 7. Protection with clause *volumus*, until the octave of Trinity, for Oliver Woodstock. de Ingham, going on pilgrimage to St. Gilles.

The like to the following :—

Robert de Bolewell, going to Ireland on the king's affairs.

The prior of Montacute, going beyond seas on the affairs of Eleanor, the king's mother, until Michaelmas.

Nicholas de Hauvill, going to Ireland, until Michaelmas.

Safe-conduct, until Michaelmas, for Eudo la Zusche, conveying by water corn and other victuals by his own sailors (*marinellos*) of Bruges-wauter, Totnes, and Dartmouth to Pembroke, Pembrokeshire, Kaermerdyn, Kedewelly and Sweyneseye, for the support of those persons who are there on the king's expedition against Llewelin son of Griffin and his accomplices in rebellion, the said sailors to bring with them in going and returning letters patent of the said Eudo as to the said victuals and the persons to whom they are to be conveyed, and also of those persons to whom they have been delivered or sold, and the said corn and victuals by no means to be converted to the support of the said rebels.

Feb. 6. Writ *de intendendo*, directed to the tenants of the manors of Randol- Woodstock. veston and Rouenor, in favour of William le Brun, king's yeoman, and Isolda his wife, to whom the king has granted the manors in fee simple.

The like with respect to the manor of Forthingbrigg.

Feb. 7. Order to Adam le Botiller, sheriff of Gloucester, to enlarge and open the Woodstock. banks of the Severn near certain weirs and elsewhere, so that there may be everywhere twenty-six feet of width near the said banks, by the view and testimony of two lawful men of the town of Gloucester and two others of the city of Worcester, specially elected for the purpose by the aforesaid counties, the king having been informed that, owing to the narrowness of the said weirs, ships and boats cannot pass through the said river without impediment and danger; such persons as resist the said sheriff in the matter to be brought before the king in Parliament on the quinzaine of Easter to receive the penalties to be provided against their contempt.

The like to Leo de Bolinton.

Mandate to Luke de Luka and his fellows, merchants of Lucca, to pay to R. le Bygod, earl of Norfolk and marshal of England, a prest of 1,000 marks out of the king's money in their hands or out of their own.

Feb. 7. Acknowledgment of the king's indebtedness to Theobald de Luka and Woodstock. his fellows, of the society of the Aldebrandi of Lucca, in 500 marks for a loan from them to the king, made at the instance of R[obert], bishop of Bath and Wells, the chancellor, and Anthony Bek, and promise to repay the same in the next fair of Boston.

Mandate to Luke de Luka and his fellows, merchants of Lucca, to repay to Frederick de Kuneo and Reginald de Manachaco and their fellows, of the society of Bernard Scoti, merchants of Piacenza, at the next fair of Boston, a loan of 1,000 marks, made by them to the king, by allowing them to that amount out of the new custom due upon wools or other merchandise bought, traded with, and exported by them, or if that be not sufficient, by money payment.
