June 21. Westminster. Licence for Edmund, the king's brother, to crenellate his house called Sauvey, in the parish of St. Clement Danes. [*Fœdera.*]

July 23. Canterbury. Simple protection, until a fortnight after Michaelmas, for Henry le Waleys, going beyond seas.

Protection, with clause *volumus*, for :—

July 24. Canterbury. Henry de Mortuo Mari, going to Ireland with Gilbert de Clare, earl of Gloucester and Hertford, for two years.

July 25. Canterbury. Roger Brabazun, going beyond seas on the king's service, for one year.

July 6. Canterbury. Mandate to the king's subjects of the commonalty of the Cinque Ports, Bayonne, Yarmouth, Ireland and elsewhere (in pursuance of the king's late mandate to them when they were ready to go on business to Gascony and Poitou, not to molest Normans or other people of the dominion of the king of France), prohibiting them on this voyage and henceforward, under pain of their bodies and goods, from attacking or molesting the said Normans or other people of the said dominion, and bidding them behave themselves prudently (*sapienter et secure*), whether in pursuing their merchandise or in landing anywhere, so that no evil can arise, and to make proclamation hereof through the whole fleet and elsewhere where seafaring people may be found.

July 7. Canterbury. Pardon to William son of William de Whytunstall, in Newcastle-upon-Tyne gaol for the death of John Turnays, as it appears by the record of Hugh de Cressingham and William de Ormesby, justices last in eyre in the county of Northumberland, that he killed him in self-defence.

Signification to W. bishop of Ely of the royal assent to the election of Odo de Wytlesheya, one of the monks, to be abbot of Thorneye.

Protection with clause *volumus*, until St. Andrew the Apostle, for the following, going to the general chapters of Cluny and La Charité :—

July 8. Canterbury. Henry, prior of Bermundeseye.
Robert, prior of St. Andrew's, Northampton.

Pardon to Robert le Clerk of Wyleswrth of his outlawry for non-appearance before the justices at Westminster to answer touching a plea of Roger de Shirburn, butcher (*carnifex*), of York, that he render an account for the time that he was the bailiff of the said Roger in Bolton Percy; as it appears by the information of John Byrun, sheriff of York, that upon the rumour thereof he surrendered to York gaol.

July 8. Canterbury. Pardon to Daniel de la Pirye, in Canterbury gaol for the death of Walter le Guet, as it appears by the record of John de Berewyk and his fellows, justices in eyre in the county of Kent, that he killed him in self-defence.

July 8. Canterbury. Pardon to John Rust, 'caumbere', for the death of Walter le Galeys, as it appears by the record of Ralph de Sandwyco and his fellows, justices appointed to deliver Newgate gaol, that he killed him in self-defence.

The like to Geoffrey de Stureye, in Canterbury gaol for the death of Walter Brid, as it appears by the record of John de Berewik and his fellows, justices in eyre in the county of Kent, that he killed him by misadventure.
