Dec. 7. Association of Thomas de Berkele, the elder, and Robert de London with Miles de Rodberewe and William de Brokworth in a commission to enquire Minster in the Isle of Thanet. by oath of good men of the county of Gloucester touching the persons who with the abbot of Kyngeswode, brother Gilbert the Granger of Haseldene and others, whose names are contained in the original writ, committed divers trespasses against Lucy, late the wife of Robert de la Mare, to whom the custody of certain lands at Chyrinton, co. Gloucester, late of her said husband, tenant-in-chief, had been committed by the king to hold until Peter, son and heir of the said Robert de la Mare, should attain his full age.

Dec. 1. Commission of oyer and terminer to Henry Spigurnel and Nicholas de la Westminster. Legh, touching an appeal in the county of Essex by Philippa, late the wife of William de Lallyng of Maldon, against Henry de Bockyngge and William his son, Edmund de Bockyngge and Peter Cock of Bockyngge, for the death of her husband. By fine of 40s. made in the Chancery.

Dec. 1. The like to Richard de Bernyngham, John de Donecastre and Adam de Westminster. Middelton, on complaint by William Fox of York, that Gerard Salveyn, sheriff of York, Hugh Scot, William Warde of Nafferton, John de Raby, Nicholas de la Haye and Walter de Burton, with others, assaulted him at York. By fine of one mark.

The like to Walter de Goushille, John de Aneslie and John de Donecastre, touching an appeal in the county of Nottingham by Thomas de Bekyngham against Thomas de Beltoft, the elder, Roger parson of the church of Belton, William de Beltoft, Simon de Beltoft, Roger son of Thomas de Beltoft, Geoffrey Orcherd, John de Gorham, John son of Hugh le Fughelere of Misterton, Henry son of Peter de Gryngeleie of Walkringham, John son of Henry Haliday of Bekyngham, Alan son of William le Fevre of Bekyngham, Nicholas Shoghel of Swaleweclyve, Simon le Tasker of Cloworthe, William Rogercok de Beltoft and William Sponer of Belton for the death of John de Bekyngham, his brother. By fine of 20s.

Dec. 1. The like to William Inge, Robert son of Payn, Edmund de Malo Lacu, Westminster. John de Foxle and John de Sutton, by oath of good men of the county of Gloucester, on complaint by John Snow, burgess of Bristol, that, dissensions having arisen between Bartholomew de Badelesmere, constable of the castle of Bristol and keeper of the town and barton there, and the then mayor and bailiffs of the town, because the complainant was an adherent of Bartholomew de Badelesmere, the mayor, bailiffs and men of the town maliciously and without cause deprived him of the liberty of the town, which deprivation being afterwards declared invalid by judgment of the court of King's Bench, the king took him and his men, lands, rents, and possessions into his protection, inhibiting all persons from inflicting on him or his household or servants any injury, molestation, loss or hindrance, and further commanded the mayor, bailiffs and men of the town under pain of forfeiture to permit the complainant and his household to remain in the town of Bristol, with his goods and wares, to trade there and to use and enjoy the liberties of the town, granted to him as to other burgesses by the king's progenitors, without inflicting any kind of molestation upon him, nevertheless certain men of the town, contemning the king's mandates, have by force hindered, and do not cease to hinder, him and his household from remaining in the town, trafficking, and using and enjoying the liberties thereof as other burgesses do, have taken and carried away his
