Grant, for life, to Edmund de Malo Lacu, on account of his good service, of the manor of Ulnedale, co. Cumberland, late of Alexander Seneschal, a rebel, which by forfeiture fell into the king's hands as an escheat, to hold for his life with its knights' fees, advowsons, wards, reliefs, escheats, mills, meadows, woods, and all other things whatsoever appertaining to the manor, by doing the services due for the manor before it fell into the king's hands.

Mandate in pursuance to John de Eure, escheator beyond Trent, to deliver the manor to him.

Writ *de intendendo* directed to the knights, free men and other tenants of the manor for him as their lord.

Licence for John de Wengrave, citizen of London, to crenellate a chamber constructed by him in the street called 'Bradestrete' in the city of London. By K., on the information of Anthony Pessaigne.

The abbot of Cîteaux, staying beyond the seas, has letters nominating John de Bekenfeld and Alan de Skautton his attorneys for five years.

Bond by the king to repay, before Midsummer day, to Robert de Leyburne 733*l.* 11*s.* 9¼*d.*, the amount of the arrears due to him, or to make him some other adequate assignment in satisfaction thereof. The king being indebted to him, as constable of the castle of Are in Scotland, as well for arrears of his wages, the wages of his followers, who had stayed with him for the strengthening of the castle, and for replacing of his horses, as for the arrears of the wages of certain soldiers (*stipendiarii*) who had also been in his train for the same purpose, whom on the king's behalf he satisfied in the sum of 1,096*l.* 16*s.* 8¾*d.* due to them for wages, granted to him the castle and manor of Cokermuthe to the value of 130*l.* a year, to hold until he should be fully satisfied in the above sum, but subsequently the king granted the same manor and castle to Edmund de Malo Lacu for his life, at which time there still remained due to the said Robert de Leyburne the sum of 733*l.* 11*s.* 9¼*d.* as well on account of arrears of the said sum of 1,096*l.* 16*s.* 8¾*d.* as for the charges and expenses incurred by him, by the king's command, in the repair and improvement of faults in the castle, as appears by an account made with him at the Exchequer.
