June 1. Exemplification, at the instance of Humphrey de Bohun, earl of Hereford
Westminster. and Essex, and for the greater security of the prior and convent of Brechon,
after inspection of the rolls of the Chancery of king Edward I., of the entry
dated 12 January, 20 Edward I., by which it appears that Edward I., after
reciting that he has learned by an inquisition made by Roger de Burghulle
and Roger le Rus, whom he had assigned to hear the complaints and suits of
the prior of Brechon touching the tithes, free court, prises of ale and toll
belonging to his church of Brechon, that the said prior and convent had and
of right ought to have their free court of all their men as well burgesses as
others of all pleas, suits and attachments, together with prises and all other
things belonging to their men, and that if any one of the men of the prior and
convent were taken for larceny or any delinquency, or in any other way in-
dicted or charged, that he ought to be judged in the court of the prior, and
that all the chattels of such man ought to belong to the prior and convent,
and that execution alone of death and limbs to the lord of Buelt, and that the
prior and convent had and of right ought to have the tithe out of all rents, pleas,
perquisites, fines, ransoms, gifts, cows of Kallemeeye, pannage and all other
profits and issues, whenever and however belonging or accruing to the castle
and land of Buelt, and that the prior and convent had and of right ought to
have tithe of all prisage of ale of the town and land of Buelt belonging to
the said castle, and that the men of the prior and convent, as well burgesses
