Oct. 6. *Inspecimus* and confirmation of an indenture of Adam de Osgodeby, king's clerk, keeper of the house of the *Conversi*, London, and the *Conversi* of the house, dated London, Sunday after the Conception of St. Mary, 8 Edward II., being a demise for life to Sir William Aylemer of Huche, chaplain, Adam his brother and Alesia daughter of Martin le Convers and wife of the said Adam, on account of the good service of the said Adam to the house, of the tenement which Sir Hugh le Convers, chaplain, bequeathed in his will to the lamp of the Holy Trinity in the chapel of the said house, situated opposite the said house in the street called 'Newstrete' of the Templars, in the parish of St. Dunstan in the West, at a rent of 14s. 1d. yearly; the lessees are to keep the tenement in repair; and in case of non-payment of the rent the keeper of the house may re-enter therein. Witnesses: Richard Wade, Martin le Convers, John the Skinner (*Pheliperio*), Richard de Oxeneford, William le Dorturer, Adam le Dorturer, William Passemer and Henry le Brewer.

Oct. 6. Exemplification of a charter accidentally burnt, dated 11 July, Walsingham. 30 Edward I. granting to Ralph de Manton, king's clerk, dean of the king's free chapel of St. Berian, Cornwall, and his successors a market every Saturday at his manor of St. Berian, and a fair during three days in the vigil, on the day, and on the morrow of St. Berian, and another yearly fair during three days, viz. in the vigil, on the day, and on the morrow of St. Martin in the Winter, provided such market and fairs are not to the injury of neighbouring ones. Witnesses: R. archbishop of Canterbury, J. bishop of Lincoln, J. bishop of Norwich, S. bishop of Salisbury, John de Warena, earl of Surrey, Henry de Lacy, earl of Lincoln, Thomas, earl of Lancaster, John de Sancto Johanne, and Walter de Bello Campo, steward of the Household, and others.

Licence for Robert son of Walter to enfeoff Thomas de Coulyng of his manor of Wymbysse, co. Essex, held in chief, and for the latter to re-grant the same to him and Alice his wife to hold to them and the heirs of their bodies, with remainder failing such issue to the right heirs of the said Robert. Oct. 6. Licence to Roger de Swynnerton to crenellate his dwelling-place of Walsingham. Swynnerton, co. Stafford. By K. on the information of R. de Northburgh.

Oct. 14. Safe-conduct, until Easter, for certain men and servants of Alice, late Ditton. the wife of Roger Bygot, sometime earl of Norfolk and marshal of England, who is staying with the king's licence in the parts of Holand, whom she is sending to her manors of Halvergate and Dovercourt, co. Norfolk, for 150 quarters of wheat and 150 quarters of barley for her household in Holland. [*Fœdera.*] By C.

Oct. 13. Safe-conduct, until Whitsunday, for certain men whom Henry Alard of Ditton. Wynchelse is sending in his ship to France with goods to trade; provided they pay the usual custom and do not comfort the king's Scotch enemies or the men of Flanders with their wares.

Oct. 8. Writ *de intendendo*, under pain of forfeiture, directed to John Mot King's Lynn. and his fellow mariners, for Humphrey de Littlebury and John Sturmy, captains and admirals of the king's fleet. The writ was issued in consequence of John Mot and his fellow mariners contemning the commands of the said Humphrey de Littlebury and John Sturmy as captains of the fleet, at which the king was much incensed.
