Pardon to John de Mikelhame for acquiring without licence to him and his heirs the manor of Mikelham and the advowson of the church thereof from Master Richard Wodelok, tenant in chief; with restitution of the same. By fine of 100s.

Pardon of the trespass of Hamo Box, sometime citizen of London, in bequeathing without licence of Edward I or of the king in mortmain 5 marks yearly of quit rent issuing from his whole tenement in the parish of St. Michael on Cornhull, London, which he bought of Robert de Rothynge, and 2½ marks of rent issuing from the tenement of Peter de Wautham, for the maintenance of a chaplain celebrating divine service for the soul of himself and all the faithful departed in the church of that parish; which rent was taken into the king's hands by Richard de Rodeneye, escheator on this side Trent. The said tenements are to remain charged with the said rents, and John Vivian and Margaret his wife, who now hold them, are not to be harassed by reason thereof. By K.

Aug. 2. Pardon of the trespass of John le Botener, the elder, citizen and mercer  
Westminster. of London, in alienating in mortmain without licence of Edward I or the king, 5 marks of quit rent receivable from his tenement with shops in the parish of St. Stephen, Colmanstrete, London, for the maintenance of a chaplain celebrating divine service daily for the souls of him and of Margery and Mabel, his wives, and of all the faithful departed, in the chapel of St. Mary, Lothebiry, London, which rent has been taken into the king's hands by Richard de Rodeneye, escheator on this side Trent; and grant that the said tenement may remain so charged, and that his heirs be not molested by reason thereof. By K.

Aug. 3. Protection for the abbey of Cumbermere, which the king has, at the  
Westminster. request of the abbot and convent, committed by reason of its impoverishment to the custody during pleasure of Robert de Notyngham, king's clerk; with the usual clause.

Aug. 4. Writ *de intendendo* directed to the knights, jurats, free men and others of  
Westminster. the island of Gernereye, for Gerard de Orons, appointed to be his deputy there by Otto de Grandissono, who holds for life the custody of that and the adjoining islands by grant of Edward I; the king having learned from the said Otto that many of those parts have disregarded a previous writ to the like effect; with power to the said Gerard to compel them thereto by distrains and attachments.
