Sept. 28.
Westminster. Pardon, at the instance of Thomas, earl of Norfolk and Marshal of England, the king's brother, to John de Dovorr', sheriff of Essex, for the escape of Richard son of Richard de Sibeston, chaplain, from the prison of Colecestre Castle, where he was detained for a larceny committed on John Wille. By p.s.
- Oct. 2.
Sheen. Pardon to Clement de Morton for acquiring for life without licence a messuage and 2 virgates of land in Boelond of John de Lenham, held in chief; with restitution of the same. By fine of $\frac{1}{2}$ mark.
- Oct. 7.
Porchester. Simple protection without clause for one year for Master Nicholas de Tyngewyk, parson of the church of Bedewynde.
- Matilda late the wife of Richard Costentyn, staying in England, has letters nominating Robert de Barowe of Barton and Robert le Lange of Barton her attorneys in Ireland for two years.
- Protection with clause *nolumus* for one year for Richard, a monk of Savigny, keeper of the house of Long Benyngton.
- Oct. 12.
Porchester. Presentation of John atte Bruge, chaplain, to the chapel of the manor of la Vacherie in the diocese of Winchester in the king's gift by reason of his custody of the land and heir of Edmund le Butiller, tenant in chief. By p.s.
- Oct. 23.
Rochester. Protection with clause *nolumus* for two years for Master Thomas de Foxton, parson of the church of Thornton (*or* Thoruton).

- Oct. 1.
Tower of London. Grant, for five years, to the mayor, sheriff and other citizens of London of murage, to be collected by Hano de Chiggewell, mayor of the city, and others whom he shall appoint. By p.s.
- Oct. 16.
Tower of London. Protection, until the Purification, for the servants whom William de Basingwerk and Maddoc de Capenhurst, burgesses and merchants of Chester, are sending to Ireland to buy 200 quarters of corn of various kinds to take to Chester.
- The like for one year for Thomas le Clerk of Ipswich, going with their ships and merchandise to divers parts of England and Gascony, and also for Henry le Rotun, his fellow.

- Licence, after inquisition *ad quod damnum* made by Richard de Rodenoye, escheator on this side Trent, for John Amory to grant in mortmain 60 acres of land in Little Maldon, parcel of the manor of Little Maldon, which is held in chief as of the honor of Peverel by knight service, to the abbot and convent of Byleye in exchange for other 60 acres of land there, held in frank almain. By fine of 20s.
- Oct. 18.
Tower of London. Licence for Joan daughter of William de Felmyngham to grant a sixth part of the manors of Felmyngham and Bekham, and the advowsons of the church of Bekham and of a fourth part of the church of Felmyngham, held in chief, to James de Whittewell and Alice his wife and Christiana daughter of William de Felmyngham, to hold to them and the heirs of the said James. By fine of 5 marks.
