MEMBRANE 23d.

March 1. Commission of oyer and terminer to Thomas de Bradeston, Roger Westminster. Hillary, Henry de Greystok and William de Chilterham, in the counties of Gloucester and Hereford, on information that John Hakelut, Agnes, his wife, and their bailiffs and ministers, have inflicted very many damages, grievances, injuries, extortions and oppressions on the men and tenants of the king's manors of Penros, Tregair, Henthles, Bryngwyn, Coitmorgan, Werneurthrek, Tre-goithel, Lanwytheryn, Lanvonor, Ebouthvaur and Ebouthvaghan, in Wales, which came into his hands as escheats by the death of William de Hastynges, from the time of the death of the said William, as well as on the king's men and tenants of lands which the said John and Agnes hold as her dower, within the lordship of Bergeveny, by the king's assignment, of the inheritance of the king's ward the heir of Laurence de Hastynges, earl of Pembroke, from the time of such assignment. March 6. Commission to the justiciary, the chancellor and others in Ireland Westminster. [as on p. 56 except that the name 'Sully' is here written 'Subly'].

Feb. 15. Commission of oyer and terminer to Richard de Wilughby, John Westminster. Paynel and John Bluet, in the county of Leicester, touching all persons concerned in the death of John Clarice of Gretton, killed at Blaston, and John Wryght of Medburn, killed at Medburn.

March 10. The like to Hugh de Courtenay, earl of Devon, William de Shares- Westminster. hull, John de Stouford, John de Dyneham and Ralph de Middelnee, on complaint by John de Monte Acuto that Ralph Brewere, John Wheton, William Smale, Walter Gordoun, Thomas Knolle, Thomas Swet, Gilbert de Fowy, Roger Pole, Nicholas Spende, John Bigge, Stephen de Herton, Peter Kenebowe, Richard de Toryton, John de Covyntre, John Moryz, Robert Boys and others, at Dertemuth, co. Devon, broke his houses, carried away his goods and assaulted his men and servants, whereby he lost their service for a great time. For 20s. paid in the hanaper.

Feb. 18. Commission to William de Shareshull, John de Stouford, John Westminster. de Inkepenne and John Elys to make inquisitions on the oath of good men of New Lemyngton and other parts of the county of Southampton touching an information that John le Wolf of Lemyngton, Luke de Gernesy and others of that county daily buy much wool in those parts and take the same to the nearest port and thence by ship to foreign parts, without the wool being taken to any staple according to the ordinance of the staple, and without payment of the custom and subsidy due to the king, to find of how much custom and subsidy the king has been defrauded in this way, and the names of those buyers and takers of such wool, and to arrest all those found guilty in the premises and imprison them until further order, and to cause such wool to be taken into the king's hands as forfeit.

Feb. 10. Commission to William de Plumpton, William de Fenton, Thomas Westminster. de Ingelby, William de Fyncheden, John de Pudsay, Thomas de Nessefeld and Roger de Eston appointing them as justices to keep
