Oct. 27. Commission, with the assent of Edmund Dysny, to whom the king
Westminster. lately committed the office of controller of customs in the port of

Oct. 26. Pardon to Arnold Rote, citizen and skinner of London, of his out-

of Almain, touching a plea that he render an account of the
time when he was their receiver; he having now surrendered to the
Flete prison, as Roger Hillary, chief justice, has certified.

Oct. 30. Presentation of John Balle of Thrandeston, chaplain, to the
Westminster. vicarage of the church of Gayeslee, in the diocese of Norwich, in the
king's gift by reason of the priory of Stokes being in his hands on

Oct. 20. Licence for John Avenel, knight, now in the king's prison by
Sandwich. process had in the king's court, in whatsoever prison, castle or other
