Pardon to John de Bures, knight, of the county of Surrey of his outlawry in the said county for non-appearance before the justices of the Bench to answer John de Leuisham of Suthwerk, 'tailleur,' touching a plea that he and William, his brother, render an account of the time when they were his receivers; he having now surrendered to the Flete prison, as Roger Hillary, chief justice, has certified.

Nov. 7. Whereas Thomas de Lucy, lord of Cokermouth and warden of the march of Carlisle towards Scotland, to whom the king lately committed power of receiving into his fealty and peace Scotch or English adherents of the Scots, his enemies, has received John son of Thomas de Skelton and pardoned him in the king's name for all trespasses to Midsummer last, as by his letters patent appears; the king for the greater security of the said John confirms such reception and pardon.
