April 30. Pardon to Richard Derlyng of Derfeld of his outlawry in the county
Westminster. of York for non-appearance before the king to answer touching divers trespasses whereof he was indicted, he having now surrendered to the Marshalsea prison, as William de Shareshull, chief justice, has certified.

April 28. Brothers Stephen and James de Armonia Majori, monks of the
Reading. monastery of Meten of the order of St. Basil, in the diocese of Galaaden, and brother Antony, lay-brother of the order, lately coming to England, made petition to the king that, whereas the realm of Armenia, for the most part at least, has been conquered out of the hands of the Christians by pagans and other worshippers of idols and occupied by those pagans, who in their desire to extinguish the Christian faith, waste churches and ceaselessly butcher Christians there, he will grant them licence to stay sometime in England under the wings of his protection to seek their food of the alms of the faithful and he has granted them the licence prayed for and taken them into his special protection and defence, for one year, so that they bear themselves faithfully and honestly. April 29. Pardon to William de Lyssyngton, chaplain, of his outlawry in

April 22. Whereas John Suthewyk and Margaret, his wife, for non-appearance
Reading. before the justices of the Bench to answer John Wynter and Agnes his wife, executrix of the will of John Snel, touching a plea of debt of 40*s.* were lately outlawed and waived, respectively, in the county of Wilts, and he has now surrendered to the Flete prison on that account, as Robert de Thorpe, chief justice, has certified, the king has pardoned his outlawry.

April 29. Pardon to John Fyveded of his outlawry in the county of Suffolk
Westminster. for non-appearance before the said justices to answer Edmund Fitz Benet touching a plea that he render an account of the time when he was his receiver; on a like certificate.
