May 8. Westminster. Licence, for the alienation in mortmain by Richard de Abberbur

May 10. Westminster. Licence for John de Eylesford to enfeoff John Boter, clerk, Baldw
de Whiteneye and Hugh de Monyton, of the manor of Westbur
co. Gloucester, said to be held in chief, and of the remainder
10 marks of rent, parcel of the manor, which William de Stynche
combe, chaplain, holds for life; and for them to grant the same to th
said John, Isabel, his wife, and his heirs.

May 10. Westminster. Pardon to Thomas de del Sheles of his outlawry in the county of
York for non-appearance before the justices of the Bench to answer
John de Evre, 'chivaler,' touching a plea that he render an account of
the time when he was his bailiff in Ingelby and his receiver; he havin
now surrendered to the Flete prison, as appears by certificate of Robert
de Thorpe, chief justice.

May 12. Westminster. Licence for the alienation in mortmain by Thomas de Elteslee and
Alan, his brother, to the prior and convent of Bernewell, in satisfactor
of 30s. of 10l. yearly of land and rent which they have the king's
licence to acquire, of nine messuages, 50 acres of land and 22d. of rent
in Bernewell, Cantebrigg, Chesterton and Comberton, which messuages
and land with the rent are worth yearly beyond the services due
therefrom 23s. 4d., as has been found by inquisition made by William
de Otteford, escheator in the county of Cambridge.

May 12. Westminster. Whereas Juliana de Leybourn, countess of Huntingdon, has granted
to William de Wauere, for his good service, counsel and aid to her,
100s. yearly out of the manor of Overlonde for her life, with power to
distrain if ever the annuity fall in arrear, the king, although the lands
of the countess are to remain to him and his heirs, has confirmed the
grant to the said William for his life. By K.

May 1. Westminster. Appointment, during pleasure, of John de Asshehurst to purvey
boards called 'estrichebord,' iron, steel (*calibem*), nails, plaster of Paris
(*plastrum de Parys*) and all other things required for the king's works
of Wyndesore and take carriage to bring the same to Wyndesore castle,
to be paid for out of the king's moneys by the hands of the king's clerk
William de Mulsho, clerk of the said works; to take as many hewers
of stone, carpenters and other artificers and workmen, as are required
for the works and put them on the works to stay thereon at the king's
wages and to arrest all contrariants and rebels and imprison them until
the king order touching their punishment
