appearing in the chancery by process made against him said nothing and shewed nothing wherefore the manor should not be seized into the king's hand on account of the said alienation, has been taken into the king's hand by judgement of the court; and likewise by another inquisition taken before the said William and Robert it has been found that the said John de Sutton alienated the manor without licence to Hugh le Despenser, le piere, who was drawn and hanged for treason, and that after his death John son of the said John de Sutton intruded himself into the manor, and enfeoffed Nicholas de la Beche of the same, without licence, and that Edmund brother of the same Nicholas intruded himself into the same without licence or process in the twentieth year; nevertheless the king, in consideration of the contents of the aforesaid letters patent and Edmund's long service to him, confirms the letters patent and restores the manor to him; and, for the greater security of the said Edmund and Thomas de Langeford, the remainder man in tail male next in succession, Robert de la Beche, John de la Beche and William de la Beche having gone the way of all flesh without heirs male of their bodies, he has pardoned all trespasses herein, granting that Edmund shall have the said manor of Bradefeld, with knights' fees, advowsons of churches, liberties, escheats, fisheries, warrens, wards, marriages, reliefs, views of frankpledge, homages, services, rents and all other appurtenances, for his life, with remainders to Thomas in tail male, and to the right heirs of the said Nicholas. July 12. Pardon, for good service done in the war of France in the company  
Westminster. of Henry, late duke of Lancaster, to John Somervill of the king's suit for the death of Robert Lynot, 'milner,' of Napton, killed before Michaelmas in the thirty-third year, whereof he is indicted or appealed, and of any consequent outlawry. By p.s.

July 12. Licence for the alienation in mortmain by William de Burton, in part  
Westminster. satisfaction of 10*l.* yearly of land and rent which he has the king's licence to assign for a chantry in the church of Little Castreton and the chapel of Tolthorp for the souls of the king and his mother, to the warden and chaplains of the said chantry, of 10 marks yearly of rent out of the manor of Conyngton, co. Huntingdon, which manor is held in chief of Queen Philippa as of the manor of Glatton now in her hand for certain causes.

July 12. Presentation of the king's clerk Richard de Daventre, parson of the  
Westminster. church of Charwelton, in the diocese of Lincoln, to the church of Wotton, in the same diocese, in the king's gift by reason of his wardship of the lands and heir of Laurence de Hastynges, late earl of Pembroke, who held in chief; on an exchange for benefices with Roger Raysoun of Welford.

June 25. Grant to the king's yeoman Thomas Cheyne of two parts of four  
Westminster. tenements, a quay and twenty cottages in the parish of St. Mary Somerset, London, which with the third part John de Gildesburgh, deceased, held of the king and bequeathed for life to Margaret, Isabel and Juliana, daughters of Isabel de Moleseye, after
