were endowed are fallen in ruin, and hospitality, alms and other works of piety are withdrawn, on hearing which he is, as well he may be, vehemently disturbed at the sight of the threatened ruin of the foundations of his progenitors and other nobles, and so, with the assent of the magnates and others, learned, of his council, he has ordained that the temporalities of deaneries &c. of the foundation of his progenitors held by such aliens now void and as they fall void shall be taken into his hand, and the others into the hands of the founder or their heirs and successors, remain in safe protection and be committed to certain ecclesiastics for safe keeping and their fruits and emoluments applied to their repair and amendment, until provision be made to them of fit persons knowing the tongue of his subjects and appointing them to take into the king's hand the temporalities of the deanery of the church of St. Peter, York, and of the prebend of Stransale in that church, now said to be void, with the issues thereon and from Michaelmas last, and keep them during the voidance to the use and utility of the deanery and prebend.
