June 3. Commission to John Dabernoun, William de Asshelden and Richard Westminster. Mewy, to make inquisition by the oath of merchants and mariners as well as of others in the counties of Cornwall and Devon touching a complaint by some merchants of Spain that malefactors of the king's realm boarded some ships of theirs, laden with goods and merchandise, off the coast of Brittany, killed many of the masters and mariners of the ships and took away the ships, and that great part of the goods and merchandise were afterwards brought to Fowy and other places in the said counties and are now in the hands of divers men there, and to arrest the goods and merchandise and keep them securely until the king give other order. They are to return the inquisition without delay, warning those in whose hands the goods and merchandise or any part thereof are found to be then before the council at Westminster to shew wherefore the goods should not be delivered to the merchants, and to have there the names of those by whom they have warned them.
