- Oct. 12. Pardon to John Mader of Wolwych of his outlawry in the county
Westminster. of Kent for non-appearance before Ralph Spygurnell and Robert
Bealknap, justices of oyer and terminer in the said county, to answer
touching divers trespasses, forestalleries and regrateries, whereof he
was indicted; he having now surrendered to prison before the justices,
as appears by a certificate of the said Ralph.
- Oct. 15. Appointment of Richard de Vale and Nicholas Mason to purvey
Westminster. timber, stone, sand and other necessaries for the repair of the castle of
Dover, and carriage for the same, also to find workmen and craftsmen
for the works.
- Oct. 13. Margaret de Ravenesholm, going on pilgrimage by the king's

citizens of London, as her attorneys in England for one year.

as Robert de Thorpe, chief justice, has certified.
