May 10. Licence for William de Say, 'chivaler,' to enfeoff Robert de Bealknap,
Westminster. William de Appeldrefeld and Roger Digge, of the manors of West-
grenewych and Codeham, co. Kent, and Sabrichesworth, co. Hertford,
held in chief; and for them to grant the same to him and Beatrice,
his wife, in tail, with remainder to his right heirs. By p.s.

May 12. William de Hamsterleye, going to Ireland on the king's service
Westminster. to stay there in the company of William de Wyndesore, has letters
nominating Henry de Codyngton, clerk, and Laurence Hauberck as
his attorneys for one year.

William de Mirfeld received the attorneys.

May 14. Licence for the alienation in mortmain by Robert de Ellerton of
Westminster. Stepelmordon and Robert de Thormondby to the prior and brethren
of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem in England, in satisfaction
of 60s. of 20l. yearly of land and rent which they have the king's licence
to acquire for making certain chantries, of a messuage, 34 acres of
land, 2 acres of meadow and 8s. 2d. of rent in Shenegeye and Stepel-
mordon, not held of the king, which are of the yearly value of
33s. 10d., as has been found by inquisition taken by John de Olney,
late escheator in the county of Cambridge.

May 14. Pardon to John son of Philip Clerk of Calkewell of his outlawry in
Westminster. the county of Lincoln for non-appearance before the justices of the
Bench to answer John de Scotton, chaplain, touching a plea of trespass;
he having now surrendered to the Flete prison, as Robert de Thorpe,
chief justice, has certified.

May 12. Pardon to John de Cavendissh and Alice, his wife, for acquiring to
Westminster. them and the heirs of the body of John from John de Clynton, knight,
an acre of pasture in Cavendissh and the advowson of the church of
that town, held in chief, and entering therein without licence; and
licence for them to retain the same. By K.

May 12. Commission to John Claver of Bury to collect in the counties of
Westminster. Norfolk and Suffolk the subsidy of cloths for sale granted to the king
in a great council lately held at Westminster in return for the remission
by him of the forfeitures of the alnage of cloths, to wit of each cloth
of assize without grain, 4d., and of the half cloth, 2d., of each cloth of
scarlet of assize, 6d., and of the half cloth, 3d., of each cloth of half
grain of assize, 5d., and of the half cloth 2½d., and of cloths exceeding a half
cloth and an entire cloth by 3 ells and more after the rate of the subsidy
for the entire cloth of the same sort, and after payment to seal all cloths
for sale under the seal ordained for this, to warn and if need be have
proclamation made that no stranger or private person on pain of
forfeiture expose cloths for sale until the subsidy be paid and the
cloth sealed, to search all houses, shops and other places in those
counties where there is cloth for sale and take into the king's hand
as forfeit all cloths for sale found unsealed, to be delivered to the
