Westminster. on complaint by John Gyboun, mayor of Cambridge, that whereas he, with others of the better men of the town, was at the Guildhall of the said town to make ordinance for the punishment of those who broke the assise of bread, wine and ale, and sold victuals of flesh otherwise than they ought to do, Stephen Morice and John, his son, came armed to the said Guildhall and vilified him with opprobrious words, and John, by the maintenance and abetting of his father, assaulted him and would have killed him with his drawn knife if he had not been rescued by others.
