The like, word for word, to Thomas Bolt of Bramwyth.

The like to John Thakestere of Burgh St. Margaret, outlawed in the county of Norfolk at the suit of John de Mendham touching a plea of debt of 40s.

June 6. The like to Peter Clerk of Coveham, outlawed in the county of Westminster. Southampton at the suit of Nicholas Kaerwent, parson of the church of Crondale, Thomas de Hungerford, Master Walter de Sevenhampton, late parson of the church of Alresford, and John Corf, parson of the church of Colyngborne Abbots, executors of the will of William, late bishop of Winchester, touching a plea that he and Alexander Dynnok render them 9l. 9s.

June 7. The like to Henry Baillif of Titheseye, outlawed in the husting Westminster. of London at the suit of William Bice, citizen of London, touching a plea of debt of 40s.

June 10. The like to John Harpere, outlawed in the county of Hereford at Westminster. the suit of David Draper of Hereford touching a plea of debt of 40s.

June 15. The like to Richard Gerard of Shrouesbury, outlawed in the Westminster. husting of London at the suit of John atte Celer touching a plea of trespass.

May 10. Licence for the prior and convent of Whiteby to elect an abbot in Westminster. the room of William, deceased.

May 10. Pardon to John Wrichte of Iseldon of his outlawry for having Westminster. stolen 2 horses at Kentissheton from the house of John Buntynford.

May 11. Protection with clause *volumus*, for one year, for Thomas Serland, Westminster. 'Lumbard,' for certain causes touching the king. By bill of p.s.

May 9. Presentation of Matthew de Whiton, chaplain, to the church of Westminster. Lanbadarn Vaur in Melenyth, in the diocese of St. Davids.

April 3. Whereas the king, on 22 June in his fortieth year, by letters patent Westminster. granted to John Harwe, then one of the grooms of the larder, an annuity of 60s. at the Exchequer for life or until other order, which letters John asserts to have been lost by mischance; and because the said John has prayed the king to have the enrolment of the letters cancelled and has promised to restore them if found: the king has granted him an annuity of 100s. as above.
