Feb. 17. Pardon to John Milner of Siston of the king's suit for the death of
Westminster. Adam Milner of Belton ; as the king has learned by the record of Roger
de Kirketon and Henry Asty, justices appointed to deliver the gaol
of Lincoln castle, that he killed him in self-defence.

Feb. 19. Exemption for life of William de Hoghton from being put on assizes,
Westminster. juries or recognitions, and from appointment as mayor, sheriff,
escheator, coroner, collector of tenth or fifteenth; arrayer or leader
of men-at-arms, armed men, hobelers or archers, or other bailiff or
minister of the king, against his will. By p.s.

Feb. 20. Pardon, for 100s. paid to the king by Richard de Morton of Scotton
Westminster. and Margery, his wife, to them of the trespass of Margery in acquiring
to herself and the heirs of the body of Thomas de Beltoft son of Peter
de Beltoft, her first husband, and herself, certain lands in Azerlegh,
co. York, by the name of the manor of Azerlegh, from the said Peter de
Beltoft, who held it in chief, and entering therein without licence,
whereupon the manor was taken into the king's hand by pretext of an
inquisition taken before Roger de Lascels, late escheator in the said
county, after the death of Peter, whereby it was found that Peter died
seised of the manor and that his heir is under age ; and grant that
Richard and Margery may hold the manor to them and the heirs of
Margery as above.

Vacated because surrendered, and nothing thereof was done.

Feb. 22. Whereas the king, on 30 April in his forty-first year, granted to
Westminster. Thomas atte Halle, late one of the keepers of his great horses, 100s
yearly at the Exchequer for life or until other order, and the said
Thomas has surrendered his letters to the intent that his nephew
Thomas atte Halle, the younger, may have the same ; the king has
granted the latter the said 100s. at the Exchequer for life or until
further order. By p.s.

Feb. 20. Grant for life to Richard de Pembrugge of the manor of Berton
Westminster. Bristol at a yearly farm of 110*l.*, and grant that he may take from
the said farm the 100*l.* yearly for life which the king by other letters
patent, surrendered at the king's order, granted him out of the farm
of 130*l.* yearly which he was bound to render for the keeping of the
castle of Suthampton, the manor and park of Lyndehirst, the New
Forest and the hundred of Rudbrigg, co. Southampton, and the
40s. of rent which the abbot and convent of Redynges render yearly
for a tenement in the said forest. The remaining 10*l.* is to be rendered
yearly at the Exchequer, and if the manor be taken out of the said
Richard's hand by the king or his heirs, then he shall take the 100*l.*
at the Exchequer for as long as the manor be out of his hands.

Feb. 26. Whereas the king lately granted licence for the alienation in
Westminster. mortmain by Richard Wodehay and others to the prior and convent
of St. Frideswide, Oxford, of the reversion of a messuage in Oxford
and other lands therein expectant on the demise of Roger de Northwode
and Emma, his wife, and now the prior and convent have prayed the
king that, whereas the said messuage is held of the abbot and convent
of Abyndon by the service of 2*s.* 8*d.* and they cannot obtain licence
