the depth of 10 feet, make inquisition touching those by whose default the damages have occurred and those who will gain by their removal, and compel them and the bailiffs of the liberties and others, by distrains and ameracements, to cleanse and enlarge the dykes and places, remove the obstructions and repair the bridges and causeways.

May 20. Commission to all sheriffs &c. to arrest Walter Lenevaunt, clerk, Westminster. and Ralph Daventre and Baldwin Taillour, his proctors, and all his aiders and abettors, and have them presented before the king and council by sufficient mainprise, bail or other pledge, together with the cause of their taking and all letters, processes and other things prejudicial to the king found with them; as the king has learned that, although Henry Blakburne, clerk, canonically obtained the church of Radeleve upon Sore by virtue of the presentation of John de Wynewyk, now deceased, the patron thereof, and long possessed it peacefully, the said Walter, well knowing the right of the said patron, suggested in the court of Rome that the church was void and pertained to the provision of the apostolic see, whereas it did not and could not, procured a provision thereof to him and various processes and personal citations against the said Henry to appear without the realm upon his right to the possession of the church, and by colour thereof by himself and his proctors strives to intrude into the said church and expel therefrom William Julyan, who has been admitted and canonically instituted therein on the resignation of the said Henry by presentation of Richard de Wynewyk, brother and heir of the said John, and patron of the church. May 20. Commission to John Haukyn, serjeant-at-arms, to receive by Westminster. indenture from the sheriff of Norfolk John de Hamsterleye, Robert de York, Thomas Everard, the elder, of Watton, Thomas Everard, the younger, Robert Pepir, John Kirkeby, John Trusebut, 'taillour,' Robert Hurtaund, Thomas Taillour of Watton, John Payn, Richard Ray, Adam Davy, Thomas Davy, Thomas Neve, Ralph Ode, Nicholas Canoun, Adam Coupere, Thomas Pepir, John Saunderisson, John Benne, John Baret, Alan Dynglove, Hugh Dobbes, Thomas Smyth and John Toute of Watton, indicted of certain felonies and trespasses before Edmund Gournay and his fellows, keepers of the peace and justices of oyer and terminer in the county of Norfolk, and detained in the gaol of Norwich castle, and bring them with all speed before the king to stand to right upon their indictment, which the king has ordered to be brought before him by writ directed to the said Edmund.

May 24. Commission to Stephen de Cusyngton, Richard Sergeaux, Henry Westminster. Nanfan, William Bruyn, Henry Percehay, William Cranewell, Robert Tresilian, John Cary, Ralph Trenewyth and Henry Trewynnard to guard all ports and sea-shores in the county of Cornwall where ships can put in, resist and destroy all persons wishing to invade the realm by land or sea, array all defensible men, furnish them with arms suitable to their estate, lead them against any enemies presuming to enter the realm, make some common sign by beacons (*ignem*) on the hills
