Oct. 23. Thomas, abbot of Oseneye, staying in England, has letters nominating Kennington. William de Newenton, his fellow-canon, and William de Kent as his attorneys in Ireland for three years. Thomas de Evesham received the attorneys.

Oct. 25. Presentation of John de Northreppes, parson, of a moiety of the church of Beston by Crostwyth in the diocese of Norwich, to the vicarage of Laxfeld in the same diocese, in the king's gift by reason of the temporalities of the priory of Eye being in his hands on account of the war with France; on an exchange of benefices with Robert de Asshele, king's clerk.

Oct. 25. Licence for the alienation in mortmain to the prior and convent of Westminister. Spaldyng, in satisfaction of 5½ marks of the 20*l.* yearly of land and rent which they had the licence of Edward II. to acquire, by Richard Renaway, of 8½ acres of land in Spaldyng, by William Salman, and the said Richard, of a messuage, two shops and 4 acres of land there, by Hugh de Swynford and Thomas de Snayth, of 9*s.* 6*d.* of rent there, by Richard le Shipwright, chaplain, of two tofts and 3 roods, 5 perches, of land there, by Thomas son of William Thurger of Spaldyng, of 7*s.* 3*d.* of rent in the same town and in Pyncebek, by Roger de Exton, clerk, of 2 acres of land and 15*s.* 6*d.* of rent, in the same towns and in Weston, and by Reginald son of John de Pekbrygge, of 5*s.* of rent in the same towns. These are held of the prior and (exclusive of the rents) are of the value of 27*s.* 5*d.* as appears by the inquisition. Licence also for the prior and convent to enter into a messuage in Spaldyng, held of the prior and convent, which John del Smythy, their bondman, acquired in fee from Wolvena de Depyng, and which is of the yearly value of 2*s.* as appears by inquisition, and to hold this in satisfaction of that amount of the said 20*l.*

Oct. 25. Exemplification under the seal now in use of letters patent, dated 23 Westminister. July, 11 Edward III. being a licence for Oliver de Denham to crenellate the dwelling-place of his manor of Sampford Peverell, co. Devon.

Oct. 28. *Inspeximus* of a grant in tail by Anthony, late bishop of Durham, to his Westminister. bachelor, Sir Brian son of Alan, knight, and Matilda his wife, of the manor of Belestre in Tyndale (as above on *Membrane 18*); and testification that
