May 2. Westminster. Presentation of Hugh de Oundel, vicar of the church of Matherssay, in the diocese of York, to the church of St. George, Staunford, in the diocese of Lincoln, in the king's gift by reason of the temporalities of the priory of St. Fromund being in his hands on account of the war with France; on an exchange of benefices with Richard de Dunham.
- April 27. Westminster. Whereas William Clapitus in the fervour of his devotion has laid out great sums in founding a new house of nuns of the order of the Preachers at Derteford, the king for that cause and that the said William may be the better able to support the charges which will have to be applied over the house in the future has pardoned him all talliages, tenths, fifteenths and other contributions as well of loans granted to the king by the citizens of London as of finding men at arms, hobelers or archers for the present passage or elsewhere wherewith he is charged by the king or his ministers by reason of his lands and goods in England. - April 23. Westminster. Whereas the king's merchant, Anthony Bache, has promised to certify him of a great sum concealed from him out of the issues of the ninth granted by the commonalty in England, in the county of Norfolk, and to sue for the same in his name, the king that in suing for the same he may be the better informed therein by John de Brunham, late clerk of the collectors of the said ninth in that county, at the request of the said Anthony has pardoned the said John all manner of sums received by him of the issues of the ninth and concealed by him comprised in the account of the collectors of the ninth or in a certificate lately sent to the exchequer by John de Shardelowe and others, appointed to inquire of such concealments, whereof he is impeached and by these presents acquits him thereof, provided always that he apply all diligence to this business. - May 4. Westminster. Pardon to Bartholomew de Surlond of Smalbergh, detained in the Marshalsea prison, of the king's suit for the death of William de Kenyngton of Smalbergh killed at Smalbergh, as it appears by the record of William Scot and his fellows, justices of the King's Bench, that he killed him in self-defence.
Pardon in like terms to Thomas son of John Gundrede of Crostweyt, detained for the death of Robert Iselene of Crostweyt, lately killed at Crostweyt.
- May 5. Westminster. Protection with clause *royamus*, for one year, for the master and brethren of the hospital of St. Giles, Botherweye, in the suburb of Oxford, and their attorneys, collecting alms in the churches.
- May 4. Westminster. Presentation of Richard de Derby, king's clerk, to the church of Hodynet, in the diocese of Coventry and Lichfield, the presentation to which the king lately recovered by judgment of the court of the Bench against Adam, abbot of Shrewsbury, as pertaining to his gift by reason of the late voidance of the abbey of Shrewsbury.

- May 4. Westminster. Pardon to Peter de Calweton of his outlawry in the county of Middlesex for non-appearance before the justices of the Bench to answer touching a plea of Roger de Wenlok, mercer of London, that he render an account for the time when he was his receiver, on certificate by John de Stonore, chief justice, that he has now surrendered to the Flete prison.
- May 7. Westminster. Whereas the king by letters patent granted a general pardon to Thomas son of Gilbert de Syngelton, on condition that he should go to Gascony
