the present king, of his devotion to the Virgin Mary, the mother of God, in whose honour the church is founded, desiring to follow out the pious intention of his progenitor with more effect, has granted to the dean and chapter of the said church and their successors for ever all tithes of his forests aforesaid, notwithstanding that they or their predecessors or the canons of the church have not in the past received such tithes by virtue of the grant of King Henry; without prejudice, however, to any to whom he or his progenitors have previously granted such tithes. Westminster. Licence, for 20 marks which Roger, bishop of Coventry and Lichfield, will pay to the king, for the alienation in mortmain by him to the vicars of the cathedral church of Lichfield of the advowson of the church of Penne, which is held in chief as parcel of the temporalities of his see and is of the taxation of 14 marks as is said; and for the appropriation of the church by the vicars. Westminster. Gift to Laurence de Hastynges, earl of Pembroke, of 396*l.* 6*s.* 6*d.* By p.s.

March 10.  
Westminster. Licence for the abbot and convent of Langedon to crenellate the gate or gate-house (*domum porte*) of the abbey. By p.s.

March 12.  
Westminster. Licence, at the request of Henry, earl of Lancaster, and for 10*l.* which the prioress of Flixton will pay to the king, for the prioress and convent of that place to appropriate the church of Fundenale, which is of their advowson. By p.s. and for 10*l.* paid in the hanaper.

March 12.  
Westminster. Whereas Master Hugh de Calce, the pope's proctor in Ireland or substitute in that land of Master Raymond Pelegrini, nuncio of the pope in England and Ireland, is indicted or impeached as well before the justices assigned to hold the pleas following the justiciary of Ireland, as in other of the king's courts there, of having held pleas on his own authority and the authority of another, whereof the cognisance was said to pertain to the king, and of other usurpations upon the royal jurisdiction as well as of divers other oppressions against him and his people of those parts wherein in some cases he has submitted himself to the king's grace, as is said, and some still remain undecided: the king, out of reverence for the apostolic see, has pardoned the said Hugh the suit of his peace and whatever else pertains to him in this behalf. March 14.  
Westminster. Appointment of John Gernoun as second justice of the Bench of Dublin, during pleasure. By p.s.  
Mandate in pursuance to the justices of the said Bench.

March 4.  
Westminster. Pardon to John son of Walter Fitz Johan of Masseworth of the king's suit for the death of Robert son of Thomas de Longemerston, and of any consequent outlawry. By p.s.

March 14.  
Westminster. Presentation of Robert atte Brugg of Lambhith to the church of Childerlangeley, in the diocese of Lincoln, void by the resignation of William de Lambhith.

March 16.  
Westminster. Presentation of Richard de Norwico to the church of Stupellangeford, in the diocese of Salisbury, in the king's gift by reason of his custody of the lands and one of the heirs of Oliver de Ingham, tenant in chief. By p.s.

March 18.  
Westminster. Presentation of Robert de Haitfeld to the church of Culne St. Dennis, in the diocese of Worcester, in the king's gift by reason of the temporalities of the priory of Donham.
