and presentation thereto of Master John de Crofth, with mandate to the bishop of Chichester to institute him.

Safe conduct, during pleasure, for Nicholas de Derby, merchant of London, going through the realm with merchandise.

Commitment, during pleasure, to Nicholas Spigornel of the counties of Norfolk and Suffolk, so that he answer at the Exchequer for the issues; and mandate to all tenants of those counties to be intendant to him as sheriff.

Presentation of Master Thomas de la Leye to the church of Folsham, in the king's gift by reason of the lands of William le Marescall, deceased, being in his hands; directed to the bishop of Norwich.

Whereas the king by charter granted to Roger de Leyburn the bailiwick of the forest of Engelwude late of Thomas de Muleton, the king's enemy, the king wills . . . . . [*Vacated.*]

Grant to Ebulo de Montibus and his heirs of the houses, with their lands, rents and other appurtenances in and without the city of London late of Richard de Walebrok, sometime citizen of London, the king's enemy.

The king wills that Roger de Lancastre, whom Roger de Leyburn has deputed in his place during the pleasure of the king and himself to keep the forest beyond Trent, because he cannot attend to it himself, shall keep the said forest accordingly.

Commitment to Isabel late the wife of Walter de Colevill of the manors of Auburn, Coynthorp, Swaffeld and Suthwithme; to hold in tenancy for the maintenance of herself, her children and household, until the king provide for her otherwise.

Protection, until Whitsunday, for Alan son of Brian de Bedale.

Simple protection, until Easter, for Walter de Wengham.

Oct. 27. Admission of the abbot and convent of St. Edmunds to the king's  
Canterbury. grace and peace and remission to them of the king's rancour conceived against them by occasion of the late disturbance; and restitution to them of their barony and all their possessions as they had them on the day on which these were taken into the king's hands, and grant that they have their die as they had it in past times.

Commitment during pleasure to Richard de Suthchirch of the counties of Essex and Hertford, so that he answer at the Exchequer for the issues; and mandate to all of the counties to be intendant to him as sheriff.

Oct. 26. Pardon, at the instance of Geoffrey de Upsale, to Richard de  
Canterbury. Calenton chaplain, for a robbery at Hanepole, and of his consequent abjuration of the realm.
