Simple protection for one year for Ralph de Bakepuz.

Grant for life to Eleanor the consort of Edward the king's son of the manor and hundred of Somerton and the manors of Puteney and Werne, which the king before committed to her during pleasure.

Notification to all bailiffs that, for the amelioration of the state of the realm and of merchants coming with their goods into the realm, the king wills that all merchants, as well denizen as alien, shall have peace and tranquility throughout the realm, and that they with their merchandise shall be under the protection of Edward his son, so that none shall take in the name of the king or any other prises on their goods and merchandise, saving to the king his due and ancient prises; also that none presume to take anything of their goods against the will of the said Edward or of the said merchants.

April 8. Windsor. Safe conduct until the Ascension for Adam de Everingham coming to the king's court to treat of his peace; so that he do no damage in the meantime to the king or his faithful.

April 8. Windsor. Protection and safe conduct until Midsummer for Margaret, countess of Derby in coming to the king's court, staying there and returning.

Confirmation of a grant by Ebulo de Montibus—to whom the king lately granted the wardship of the lands and heirs of Iseult de Lenham, daughter of one of the heirs of Maud de Haveringes tenant in chief, with wards, reliefs, escheats, advowsons of churches and all other appurtenances, and with the marriage of the said Iseult—to Philip Basset of the manor of Bukeland with the advowson of the church of the said manor, which are of the said wardship, to hold until the full age of the heirs.

April 9. Windsor. Licence, at the instance of Edward the king's son, for Henry Huse and his heirs to enclose a place at his manor of Hertinge co. Sussex, to wit wherever within the manor shall appear most expedient with a dyke and a wall of stone and lime and to crenellate the same at their will.

Safe conduct until the Ascension for Stephen Soudan in coming to the king's court to treat of his peace; provided that he do no damage in the meantime to the king or his faithful.

April 10. Windsor. Simple protection for one year for the abbot of Heyles.
The like for one year for William de Colevill; provided that the king have not given his lands to any one and that he stand his trial if the king or another wish to proceed against him.

The like until Michaelmas, at the instance of Hugh le Bygod, for Thomas de Cumberland and Amice his wife, citizens of London.

April 4. Westminster. Grant to Martin Thomas de Wimundham, king's clerk, the treasurer, of the first wardship that falls in of the value of 50*l.* a year with the marriage of the heirs of the same wardship, unless before then the king have provided for him in a dignity, prebend or ecclesiastical benefice of the value of 200 marks yearly, which the king promises to
