Oct. 18. Pardon to Robert Busard for the death of Jordan Coc; as it  
Kenilworth. appears by inquisition made by John le Bretun that he killed him in  
self defence.

Simple protection for two years for the master and brethren of  
the hospital of St. John the Baptist without the north gate of Cestre.

Simple protection for one year for Walter de Doninton.

The like for Richard de Houton, chaplain of Edward the king's son,  
and Robert, leech of the same.

Oct. 20. Pardon, at the instance of Edmund the king's son, to Ralph de  
Kenilworth. Ginges of all debts, fees, penalties and usuries wherein he is bound by  
his charters to any of the king's Jews, and grant that he and his heirs  
be for ever quit thereof.

Simple protection for the following :—

Master John le Romeyn, for two years.

The master and brethren of the hospital of St. John the Baptist  
without Newcastle under Lyme, for three years.

Martin de Lega,  
William Gerard of Matesden, } for one year.

Pardon at the instance of Nicholas le Lou to Robert Polle for the  
death of William the Cook of Graneby.

Simple protection for one year for Henry son of Simon de  
Hertlingeburg.

Safe conduct for one month for the disinherited as well of the Isle  
of Ely as elsewhere or their messengers whom R. le Bygod, earl of  
Norfolk and Marshal of England, shall bring with him to the king.

Oct. 22. Licence for Warin de Bassingburn and his heirs to enclose his houses  
Kenilworth. of Bassingburn co. Cambridge and Esteleye, co. Warwick, with a  
dyké and wall of stone and lime and to crenellate the same and keep  
them so in perpetuity.

Whereas the king lately commanded the treasurer and barons of  
the Exchequer to search the rolls of the Exchequer and the book  
called Domusdey, and to let the king know how the abbot and monks  
of Stanleie hold the manor of Stanleie which is of the ancient  
demesne, and they have signified to the king that in the second roll  
of king . . . . it is contained that the said king gave to the monks  
of Rademere his manor of Stanleie which was then contributing  
(*portabat*) to the *corpus* of the county 17*l.* 14*s.* 6*d.*, and in the said book  
in Warewik amongst the lands of the king. The king holds in Stanleie.  
King Edward held. There are 6 hides. There is land for [blank].  
In demesne are 5 ploughs and one serf and one maid and 6[8] villeins  
and 4 *bordarii* with two priests: they have 30 ploughs. There are  
2 mills of 35*s.* 4*d.* and 20 acres of meadow: wood 4 leagues long and  
2 leagues broad: pasture for 2[000] swine.
