*Membrane 32—cont.*

As it appears by inquisition made by the keeper of the forest between the bridges of Oxford and Stanford that John son of Nigel ought to hold of the king in chief by hereditary right the bailiwick of the forest of Bernewod, to wit, from Stoniford to the water called la Burne which runs between Steplecleydon and Padebury and a hide of land in Borstall, called Derhyde, rendering 50s. a year, and that he should moreover keep the said forest; and that the said John and his ancestors have held this bailiwick of the king and his ancestors from the conquest of England; the king grants that he and his heirs shall hold it as he and his ancestors have held it in times past.

[Dec. 5.] Pardon, at the instance of Bartholomew le Bygod, to Hugh son of  
Kenilworth. Alice de la Funtayne of Cosham for breaking the king's prison of Salisbury and of any consequent outlawry.

Pardon, at the instance of the king's serjeant Walter Achard to Alan le Lung of Neubiry for breaking the prison of Rading and of his consequent abjuration of the realm.

Dec. 5. Simple protection for seven years for Henry de Bratton.  
Kenilworth.

Dec. 5. Whereas Gerard de Furnival before the battle of Evesham came  
Kenilworth. to the king's peace and was received into it by Thomas de Boulton, serjeant of Edward the king's son, who was empowered by Edward to do this, and he has behaved faithfully since, as appears by trustworthy testimony; the king has received him into his grace and remitted to him his indignation and rancour of mind conceived towards him on account of his trespasses in the time of the disturbance in the realm; and pardons to him the said trespasses according to the form of the award of Kenilworth.

Nov. 27. Grant to John de Verdun of murage in aid of his town of  
Kenilworth. Lodelawe for five years from the feast of St. Andrew the Apostle, 51 Henry III.

Grant for life, for the safety of the king's soul and the souls of his ancestors, to William de Persore, chaplain, of the chapel of Newenham and the place there belonging to it, on condition that he repair the said chapel and cause a hospital to be made there, and celebrate divine service in the chapel daily and remove the hospital of the said town from the place where it now is and cause it to be placed at the said chapel at his own cost, saving the right of everyone.

Dec. 8. Presentation of Walter de Odyham to the church of Cotes, void  
Kenilworth. by the death of Master Luke de Peynton, the late rector; directed to R. bishop of Norwich.

Grant to Thomas de Ipegrave of 20*l.* a year by the hands of the king's bailiffs of Oxford, until the king provide for him in wards or escheats more bountifully.

Whereas because of the trespasses which William de Evereus who stood with the king in the battle of Lewes, was said to have done afterwards against the king and Edward his son, the king after
