## MEMBRANE 5.

Grant for life, at the instance of William Belet, to Alexander de Wastele, merchant, of quittance from tallages &c. [*in the same terms as to Nicholas de Weston above*].

Protection, with clause, for one year, for Richard de Hotot, gone to Almain with the king of Almain.

Simple protection, without clause, for two years, for Roger de Grey and Beatrice his wife.

The like, for one year, for the abbot and convent of Cumbe.

Remission to Gilbert de Gaunt of the king's indignation and rancour of mind towards him by occasion of trespasses which he was said to have done in the time of the late disturbance and pardon of the said trespasses; ratification also of the restitution made to him by H. son of the king of Almain, of his lands which the king had given to the latter.

Simple protection, without clause, for the following:—

William son of Daniel, for one year.

Agnes de Insula and William her son, for two years.

Joan late the wife of Robert de Lathum, for one year.

The prior of Bristol, for two years.

Grant to John de Balliolo of the ransom due to the king according to the form of the award of Kenilworth for 16*l.* yearly of land of the lands of Henry de Hastings in Wadington, Belteford, Haverberg, Donington, Golkesby, and Repindon.

Whereas the king lately committed to Roger de Lancaster the county of Lancaster for life, so that he should render 100 marks a year at the Exchequer and afterwards granted the said county to Edmund his son for his sustenance; promise to the said Roger to save him harmless in the premises.

Protection, with clause, for one year, for William Peche, going to Ireland on the affairs of Edward the king's son.

Grant for life to Eustace Heyrun, king's serjeant for long service, of 10*l.* a year from the farm of the town of Newcastle upon Tyne.

Simple protection, without clause, for one year, for John de Forton.

Respite for three years, for a fine of 5 marks paid into the wardrobe, to John Mauleverer from making himself a knight.

Grant for life to William le Wenche, yeoman of Queen Eleanor, of 4½*d.* a day which Henry le Tieys, king's serjeant, deceased, used to receive from the appointed alms.

Whereas the king lately commanded the barons of the Exchequer to search the rolls of the Exchequer and find whether the king is bound to Adam de Gesemuth in any debts for the time that he was sheriff of Northumberland and constable of the castle of Newcastle
