June 9. Pardon to Andrew Mor of Stanford for the death of John son of
Westminster. John le Flemmeng, as it appears by inquisition made by Richard de Hemynton and Geoffrey de Sancto Marco that he killed him when pursuing him with hue and cry as he fled refusing to be taken after he had killed Benedict Mor of Stanford.

Luke de Weledon has a like pardon for the said death.

Grant to Master John de Chishull, dean of St. Paul's, London, the king's treasurer, that he and his successors may, without impediment of the king or his bailiffs or even of the citizens of London or others, hold two buttressed piers (*columpnas botericias*) which the said dean has caused to be made on the south side of his chapel built in honour of the glorious martyr Thomas, archbishop of Canterbury, built in his court within the enclosure of the minster of St. Paul, London, which threatened ruin and the dean caused to be repaired.

Licence to William Belet and his heirs to crenellate his house of Marham, co. Norfolk.

Acknowledgment that Master Bonettus de Sancto Quintino, king's clerk, collector of the tenth granted to the king by the pope in the bishopric of Rochester delivered by order of the king to Richard de Ewell, buyer of the wardrobe, 6*l.* 15*s.* to execute the king's orders with in the fifty-fifth year; and acquittance to him of that sum.

Acknowledgment that the burgesses of Scardeburg delivered to Giles de Audenardo, king's clerk, and his fellows, receivers of the twentieth at the New Temple, London, by the hands of Robert Eudonis and Henry son of Richard on Wednesday, the eve of St. Barnabas the Apostle, 55 Henry III, 100 marks whereby they made fine for the twentieth incident to them.

The like to the abbess of Berkyng of the twentieth incident to her and her villeins.

MEMBRANE 13.

June 13. Whereas in the present voidance of the archbishopric of Dublin
Westminster. by the death of Fulk de Saunford, the king granted to Edward his son all the issues and profits of the archbishopric for his expenses in aid of the Holy Land, saving knights' fees, wards, reliefs and escheats, and advowsons of abbeys, priories, dignities, prebends, and churches; the king commands his clerk Master William de Bakepuz, escheator of Ireland, not to intermeddle in the keeping of the said archbishopric, but to permit the attorneys of the said Edward to take the issues, and if he have taken any to restore them to these; with the provision that he keep safe the said fees, wards &c.

Writ *de intendendo* to the tenants in favour of the attorneys of the said Edward.

Pardon to Robert son of Richard de Wlterton for the death of Michael de Wlterton; as it appears by inquisition made by Robert Fulconis that he killed him in self defence.
