Oct. 26. Simple protection without clause, for three years, for Matthew Westminster. the goldsmith of Pontefract.

Whereas in certain contentions and plaints moved in the king's court between Master John de Garlond, canon, of 15 marks in the church of Rouen out of those four prebends which are constituted in the chapelry of Blyth, and Master Stephen de Ponte Sancti Petri, proctor of the dean and chapter of the church of Rouen, the king gave his clerks John de Kirkeby, dean of Wymburn and John de Sancto Dyonisio, rector of the church of Kyminton, to the parties as auditors to decree what of right ought to be ordained, and these have pronounced their ordinance, as contained in their letters; the king confirms the said ordinance.

Commission of oyer and terminer to Robert de Nevill, John de Oketon and Geoffrey de Nevill, touching trespasses committed by Roger de Lancastre, his ministers, and others of the county of Cumberland against the king's son A. king of Scotland, within the latter's lands of Penreth; and mandate to them, before the taking of the inquisition to let the said king have reasonable notice thereof to send from his side such as may attend to the prosecution of the inquisition.

The like to the same as A. king of Scotland by letters and envoys has several times required of the king, touching trespasses against the said king and his men of Penreth, done by Roger de Lancastre, late steward of the forest beyond Trent, and his ministers and men as well as by others of the county of Cumberland; on condition that reasonable notice be given to the king of Scotland before the taking of the inquisition.

Commission to Master Richard de Clifford, escheator on this side Trent, to enquire touching the bearing of taxers and assessors of the twentieth in aid of the Holy Land in divers counties without his bailiwick, as the king is informed that these have borne themselves ill.

Appointment of Henry de Monte Forti to enquire by juries of the county of Wilts whether William le Gredere killed John le Enveyse in self defence.

The like of John de Oketon to enquire by jurors of the county of Leicester whether Geoffrey de Birstal killed Roger de Birstal in self defence.

Commission to Master Richard de Clifford and William de Windesore, king's clerks, to enquire by jurors of the counties of Kent, Surrey and Sussex, touching the behaviour of the taxers and collectors of the twentieth granted to the king and Edward his son, in aid of the Holy Land, in those counties, how much they received and from what persons and how much each township paid; and how the jurors of cities, boroughs, and market and other towns behaved in the said taxation and collection and whether they assessed it faithfully or grieved the poor above measure; and to take swift amends for unjust
