Feb. 6. Mandate to N. bishop of Bath and Wells or his vicar-general to admit
Westminster. the king's clerk John Frank to the prebend of Wandestre in the
cathedral church of Wells, which the king has granted to him. By p.s.
Mandate to the dean and chapter to instal him. By p.s.

Feb. 3. Pardon to John Mortymer the younger of Farewey, indicted of
Westminster. having on Thursday before St. Peter in Cathedra, 7 Henry IV, carried
off three ewes worth 3s. of the goods of Simon Spray and three ewes
of the goods of Stephen atte Wille worth 3s. at Fayrewey in the
tithing of Farewey and also etc. (*as on pp. 33, 35.*) By p.s.

Feb. 1. Licence, for 12 marks paid in the hanaper by the prior and convent
Westminster. of Wytham, for the alienation in mortmain to them by John Wykyng
and Isabel late the wife of Thomas Tanner of Wellis of 3 messuages,
60 acres of land and 18 acres of meadow in Woky and Yerdele and
by Robert Neel, clerk, and Thomas Bathe of 2 messuages in May-
denbradelegh, not held of the king, in aid of their maintenance.

Jan. 8. Grant for life to the king's servant Nicholas Harewod, clerk of the
Westminster. king's stable, of 6*d.* daily at the Exchequer; in lieu of a like grant
to John de Clynton by letters patent, surrendered. By p.s.

Feb. 4. Licence for Robert Tirwhyte to grant an acre of land in Heppeswell
Westminster. and the advowson of the church of the same town, not held of the
king, to the abbot and convent of Louthepark in mortmain for the
support of certain divine obsequies according to his ordinance, and
for them to appropriate the church in mortmain, provided that a
vicarage be sufficiently endowed and a competent sum of money
from the fruits of the church distributed yearly among the poor
parishioners according to the ordinance of the ordinary and the
form of the statute. By K.

Jan. 28. Grant for life to the king's esquire John Cope of the office of porter
Westminster. of the castle and manor of Moresend with 3*d.* daily for his wages and
other profits from the issues of the same and also 12 marks 6s. 8*d.*
yearly from the issues of the castle; in lieu of like grants by letters
patent of Richard II. to William Dyggeley, who has personally taken
oath in Chancery that the letters have been accidentally lost and
will be surrendered if found. By p.s.

Feb. 6. Grant for life to William Champeneys, for his good and gratuitous
Westminster. service in the office of one of the clerks of the crown of Chancery, of
10*l.* yearly from the issues of the hanaper. By K.

Feb. 10. Revocation of letters patent dated 22 July, 9 Henry IV, com-
Westminster. mitting to Richard Ulverston, clerk, the keeping of a plot of waste,
30 acres of land, 2s. rent and 3 acres and 3 roods of meadow in Tad-
castre, co. York. By an inquisition taken before Thomas Egmonton,
late escheator in the county, on 27 February, 8 Henry IV, it was
found that Robert Esyngwold, an insurgent against the king in the
company of Henry Percy, late earl of Northumberland, on 8 May,
6 Henry IV, in the county of Northumberland, and afterwards about
