Jan. 25. Pardon to the king's esquire William Fymbarwe, marshal of the  
Westminster. King's Bench, of 10*l.* incurred by him because Bertram Barre of  
Gascony, appealed and convicted by inquisition of felony, escaped  
from his keeping before judgement; to the end that John Roper,  
one of the ministers of the said William, who is imprisoned on account  
of the escape, may be set at large. By p.s.

March 3. Grant for life to the king's servant of the office of the pantry of  
Westminster. the household John Blakwell of the office of keeper of the gate of the  
new tower in the town of Southampton with the accustomed fees,  
wages and profits, as John Treule, now deceased, had.  
*Vacated because elsewhere in this year.* By p.s.

March 10. Grant to the king's clerk John Wakeryng of the archdeaconry of  
Westminster. Canterbury. By K.  
Mandate in pursuance to T. archbishop of Canterbury. By K.

Feb. 24. Grant, during pleasure, to John Grene of the office of coroner of  
Westminster. the household with the due profits; in lieu of a like grant to Thomas  
Holgil by letters patent dated 1 February, 6 Henry IV, surrendered  
so far as concerns the same. By K.

March 19. Presentation of Robert Hood, chaplain, to the vicarage of the  
Maidstone. church of Tywardrayth, in the diocese of Exeter, in the king's gift  
by reason of the alien priory of Tywardrayth being in his hands on  
account of the war with France.

Feb. 20. Attornment of John Legburn, clerk, and William Louthe, citizen  
Westminster. and goldsmith of London, to deliver in the king's name to the dean  
and chapter of the cathedral church of St. Paul, London, full seisin  
of 6 messuages, etc., according to the form of certain letters patent  
(*see p. 50*). By K.

March 1. Appointment, during good behaviour, of Richard Maydeston as  
Westminster. assayer of the mint and controller of the master of the mint within  
the Tower of London, receiving the accustomed wages and fees.  
By bill of the treasurer.

March 1. Licence for Robert Whytyngnam, Robert Broune, parson of the  
Westminster. church of St. John on Walbroke, and Thomas Holewell, clerk, to  
grant in mortmain three messuages in London, viz., one in the parish  
of St. Martin Orgar in Candelwykstrete, one in the parish of St. John  
on Walbroke in the ward of Walbroke, and one in the same parish of  
St. John in the ward of Dougate called 'le Coppedhall,' held of the  
king in free burgage as is all the city and worth 1*l.* 17*s.* yearly, as  
appears by an inquisition taken by Drew Barantyn, mayor and  
escheator, to the master, wardens, brethren and sisters of the gild of  
fraternity in honour of God and the Body of Our Lord Jesus Christ  
had by the skinnners of London, in full satisfaction of a licence by  
letters patent of Richard II. By p.s.
