March 7. Whereas Elizabeth late the wife of Philip la Vache, 'chivaler,' Westminster. has shown the king how John Harleston, 'chivaler,' Thomas Brook, clerk, and Robert Fulmer, having estate in the reversion of the manor of Hoggenorton, co. Oxford, which she holds for life, to the use of the said Philip, by his assent and by a fine levied in 22 Richard II. granted the reversion to Thomas Percy, earl of Worcester, Thomas Blount, 'chivaler,' Thomas Clanvowe, 'chivaler,' John Boor, clerk, Richard Wyot, Richard Overton and William Grisele, clerk, and their heirs and assigns to the use of the said Philip, and afterwards the said earl and Thomas Blount were convicted of divers treasons and put to death, and subsequently the said John Boor, Richard Overton and William died and the said Thomas Clanvowe and Richard Wyot granted the reversion to Edmund Hampden, John Buktoft, clerk, Walter Gayton and others by the assent and request of the said Philip to his use, and the said John Buktoft and others released their right therein to the said Edmund: the king, at her supplication, releases to the said Edmund any right he may have in the manor and reversion to accomplish the intention of the said Philip. March 10. Grant for life to the king's kinsman Thomas, archbishop of Can- Westminster. terbury, of the castle and lordship of Quenesburgh with profits and commodities. By K.

Vacated by surrender and cancelled, because Henry V. on 21 March in his first year granted the same to his esquire Gilbert Umfravill for life.

March 17. Foundation of a chapel built in honour of St. Mary Magdalen in a Westminster. field called 'Hateleyfeld' in Adbryghton Huse, co. Salop, in accordance with a licence by letters patent (*see Vol. III. p. 263*), into a perpetual chantry of eight chaplains, of whom one shall be master, to celebrate divine service in the chapel; and grant that the chantry shall be incorporate and the master shall be called the master of the chantry of St. Mary Magdalen by Shrewsbury and the master and chaplains shall have power to acquire possessions in mortmain; and licence for them to appropriate in mortmain in aid of their maintenance the church called Michaelleskirke, co. Lancaster, in the diocese of York, the advowson of which as parcel of the king's inheritance of Lancaster the king wishes to give them by letters patent under the seal of the duchy of Lancaster, provided that a vicarage be sufficiently endowed and a competent sum of money distributed yearly among the poor parishioners from the fruits of the church according to the ordinance of the diocesan. March 10. Grant for life to the king's son John of 100*l.* yearly from Michaelmas Westminster. last from the great custom of wools and wool-fells in the port of London; in lieu of a like grant to Nicholas Ryvenys and Anne his wife, now deceased, by letters patent dated 13 November, 2 Henry IV, surrendered.
