March 23. Presentation of Richard Hoo, parson of the church of Bonyngton  
Westminster. in the diocese of Canterbury, to the church of St. Martin without  
the walls of Canterbury, in the same diocese, on an exchange of  
benefices with Robert Hébyng.

March 23. Signification to pope John of the royal assent to the postulation  
Westminster of Master Henry Chicheley, bishop of St. Davids, as archbishop of  
Palace. Canterbury in the place of Th. deceased. [*Fædera.*] By p.s.

April 19. *Inspeximus* and confirmation to John Forster of letters patent  
Westminster. dated 20 February, 9 Henry IV, granting to him for life 4*d.* daily ;  
so that he be not retained with anyone else.

April 17. Presentation of John York, chaplain, to the chantry of St. Thomas  
Westminster. the Martyr in the chapel of All Saints, Newcastle on Tyne, in the  
diocese of Durham.

April 20. John Hertipole, clerk, staying in England, has letters nominating  
Westminster. Thomas Bacon, esquire, and Walter Ever, esquire, his attorneys  
in Ireland for one year.  
John Waker[ yng ], clerk, received the attorneys.

April 17. *Inspeximus* and confirmation to the men of the town of Heya of  
Westminster. a charter dated 29 January, 9 Henry IV [*Charter Roll, 9 Henry IV,*  
*No. 12*], inspecting and confirming letters patent dated 8 January,  
9 Henry IV, exemplifying the tenour of the enrolment of a charter  
dated 6 June, 7 John. [*Rotuli Cartarum, p. 153.*]  
For 20*s.* paid in the hanaper.

March 24. Grant to William Islep of the wardenship of the hospital of St.  
Westminster. Margaret by Huntingdon, vacant by the resignation of William  
Goldyngton.

April 16. Presentation of John Spycere to the church of Wodechirche, in the  
Westminster. diocese of Canterbury, in the king's gift by reason of the temporalities  
of the archbishopric of Canterbury being in his hands.

April 10. Presentation of William Tanfeld, warden of the free chapel of  
Westminster. Eppyngheth, in the diocese of London, to the deanery of the free chapel  
of Hastynges, in the diocese of Chichester, on an exchange of benefices  
with William Hawe.

May 5. Mandate to the justices of the King's Bench and others to permit  
Leicester. William Ferrers of Groby, 'chivaler,' lord of the town of Lutter-  
worth, co. Leicester, to have a market there weekly on Thursday and  
a fair there yearly on the vigil and the day of the Ascension as he  
and his ancestors have had time out of mind, notwithstanding any  
proclamation on the king's part or that the Parliament and the  
king's court before the king are at present held at Leicester or that  
the household is now at Leicester.
