Buckingham, on Monday before All Saints, 9 Henry V, before Thomas Wydvyle then sheriff of Northamptonshire, Richard Knyghtley and John Waren, commissioners of Henry V, whereby it was found that John Peyntour in their commission named, held in his demesne as of fee on the day on which he became approver to Henry V, certain lands and tenements in Fenystratford, that is to say, two messuages called respectively, 'le Cok super le Hope' and 'le Key sur le Hope,' in Watlyngstrete, and a cottage in front of (*coram*) 'le Bocherie' of Fenystratford Citra, which premises are the same as those conveyed by the deeds above mentioned, and the said John Peyntour had nothing in them after the first named feoffment aforesaid, and therefore not on the day when he became approver being Monday before the quinzaine of Easter, 9 Henry V. June 16. Commission to John Yerd the younger, and Stephen Lillebourne to act

Westminster. to hold inquisition as to escapes of traitors and felons in the said county.
