It was found by inquisition taken before Thomas Shyngelton, late escheator in the county of Buckingham, that John Barton, the younger, held on the day of his death, being jointly enfeoffed with John Cottessmore, John Longevyll, Thomas Payn, William Thommes, clerk, and Gilbert Bury, clerk still surviving, the manor of Donyngton of the gift and feoffment, made without royal licence, of Richard Baynard, Robert Darcy, Richard Fox, and Richard Duryvall, clerk, to the said feoffees and to John Barton the elder since deceased, and that the manor is held of the king by knight service. The manor was accordingly taken into the king's hands, but now, for 45 marks paid in the hanaper, he has pardoned the trespass and granted licence for the said surviving feoffees to have again and to hold the premises.
