- Oct. 23. *Inspeximus* and confirmation, in favour of William Asthorp, of letters patent dated 7 October, 39 Edward III., exempting him, for life, from being put on assizes, &c. For $\frac{1}{2}$ mark paid in the hanaper.

- Oct. 24. Pardon, for half a mark paid to the king by William son of Stephen Brounson, for his trespass in acquiring in fee a messuage and a bovate of land in Halum in Sheffield from Thomas de Fournyvall, knight, who held them in chief of the late king as parcel of the castle and manor of Sheffield, and entering thereon without licence; and restitution of the premises to him as acquired.

- Oct. 15. Presentation of John de Wendlyngburgh the younger, prebendary of the altar of St. Mary in the collegiate church of St. John, Beverley, to the prebend which Reginald de Hylyngton lately had in the king's free chapel of St. Stephen, within his palace of Westminster, on an exchange of benefices with John de Wendlyngburgh the elder, prebendary of Wodelond, in the collegiate church of Holy Cross, Criditon, in the diocese of Exeter, and rector, or warden, of the free chapel of St. Thomas up Grene of Shireburn, in the diocese of Salisbury. - Oct. 15. Mandate in pursuance to the dean and college of St. Stephen's chapel.

- Oct. 28. Appointment, during pleasure, of Stephen Brunne to the office of controller of petty customs in the port of the city of London from All Saints, on condition that he execute the office in person. By bill of treasurer.

- Oct. 31. Grant, for life, to the king's servant, Reginald Goldsmyth, of the custody, during good behaviour, of the king's wood of Welyngton Hay under le Wreken, with the profits thereof. By p.s.

- Nov. 5. Licence for William Asthorp, knight, and Margaret his wife, to crenellate the dwelling house of their manor of Hemyok with a wall of stone and lime. By p.s.

- Aug. 10. Licence for the alienation in mortmain by the warden and chaplains of the college of St. Gregory, Sudbury, to the abbot and convent of St. Peter's, Westminster, of a messuage and three shops in the parish of St. Michael, Cornhull, in the city of London, late of John de Triple, held in burgage, in exchange for a messuage, 210 acres of land, $1\frac{1}{2}$ of meadow, 15 of pasture, and 23s. rent, and a rent of a pound of pepper, $4\frac{1}{2}$ quarters of wheat, a cock, a hen and a day-work in the autumn in Sudbury, Melford, Bulmere, Thorp, Morieux, Aketon, Middelton, Cavendissh, Brondon, and Edwardeston, commonly called the priory of St. Bartholomew, Sudbury, and a cell of the said abbey, and which, with the exception of 80 acres, are held in chief as the endowment of the priory. - Nov. 10. Licence, at the request of John de Scarle, parson of the church of St. Mary, South Kelleseye, for 40s. paid in the hanaper, for the alienation in mortmain by the prior and convent of Elsham of 6 marks' rent from their possessions in the county of Lincoln, not held in chief, to a chaplain for celebrating divine service daily in that church for the souls of William de Kelleseye, clerk, his parents, ancestors and others, according to the ordinance of Peter de Kelleseye, dean of Newerk, Leicester; in satisfaction of a like licence granted to the said William, for 8 marks, for the alienation by him of six messuages, 200 acres of land, 40 of meadow, and 6s. 8d. rent in South Kelleseye, North Kelleseye, and Castre by Grymesby to a chaplain for the same purpose, but he dying before execution of the said licence, the late king, at the suit of his executors, the said Peter, then parson of the church of Navenby, and Roger de Bromleye
