- Nov. 19. Grant to Richard de Clifford, king's clerk, of the prebend which John de Westminster. Blokle lately had in the king's free chapel of St. Stephen within his palace of Westminster. By signet letter.
Mandate in pursuance to the dean and college.
- Nov. 15. *Inspecimus* and confirmation, in favour of Isabella de Beauchamp, kins- Westminster. woman and heiress of Miles Neirnut, of a charter dated Westminster, 30 January, 15 Henry III., being a grant to the said Miles and his heirs of free warren in his manor of Hiccheham. [*Charter Roll, 15 Henry III., No. 11.*] For $\frac{1}{2}$ mark paid in the hanaper.
- Nov. 21. Mandate to the dean and chapter of the king's free chapel of Hastynges Westminster. to induct William de Norton, king's clerk, into the prebend of Stone, void by the death of Thomas Kyngesbury, to which William, bishop of Chichester, has admitted and instituted him.
- Nov. 18. Licence for the acquisition in mortmain by the monks of the newly- Westminster. founded Carthusian monastery at Coventre, who have no possessions besides the plot of land which they inhabit, of the advowsons of churches to be appropriated by them, of the clear yearly value of 100*l.* beyond the portions assigned to the vicars. - June 28. Commission to Edward Dalyngrigg and Robert Derby, John Bisshopton Westminster. and Michael de Norburgh, clerks, to visit the hospital of St. Mary, Chichester, and enquire touching defects in the houses, buildings, books, vestments and ornaments through the negligence of its warden and ministers, also touching the diminished number of the chaplains, brethren and sisters, and the waste and alienation of divers of its lands and goods.
- July 7. Commission to Thomas Maundevill the younger, William de Castelaere, Westminster. Thomas Sewale and John Basset of Chishull to enquire what other lands Humphrey de Bohun, late earl of Hereford and Essex, tenant in chief, whose daughter Mary is a minor and in the king's custody, held on the day of his death in the counties of Essex, Hertford, Norfolk, Suffolk, Middlesex, Huntingdon, Bedford, Buckingham, Hereford, Gloucester, Oxford, Devon, Dorset, Surrey and Wilts, besides those contained in the inquisitions returned into Chancery.
- June 29. Commission to Roger de Fulthorp, Robert de Morton, Robert de Haldanby, Westminster. William de Swynflete and Robert Gauke, at the supplication of the men of Merskland, co. York, and the isle of Haxholm, co. Lincoln, to enquire whether after, by virtue of letters patent of Edward II., John de Donecastre and others cleared the river Done (the division between those counties and which serves for the passage of ships to the Trent and for sewerage the lands adjacent) of obstructions between places called 'Crullfethill' and 'Dem-myn' to a breadth of 16 feet and a barleycorn, bridges, weirs and other obstructions have since been made in diminution of its breadth, and to cause the same to be removed at the expense of the men of those parts.
- July 14. Commission of over and terminer to Ralph de Cromwell, William de Westminster. Skipwith, Thomas de Themelby and Thomas Claymond, on complaint by William Wale of Conynges[by] and Agnes his wife that John Bramble of Conyngesby and others assaulted the said Agnes at Conyngesby, co. Lincoln.
